New Dental Program Launching In Naturita Elementary/Middle School

The Tri-County Health Network (TCHNetwork), 3-year, \$500,000 SMILES Dental Project grant from the Caring for Colorado Foundation and Colorado Health Foundation. They plan to launch Skippy+ at Naturita Elementary School in Naturita and Telluride Elementary School in Telluride during the Spring 2017 semester. These schools were selected due to the high level of need and lack of dental providers that accept Medicaid and CHP+ in the surrounding area TCHNetwork plans to bring Skippy+ to other schools throughout Montrose, San Miguel and Ouray counties in years 2 and 3 of the grant.
"We are honored that the Tri-County Health

Network selected Naturita Elementary as one of the Skippy+ pilot sites. Skippy+ breaks down barriers to dental care for our students by offering state-of-the-art services in our schools," said Superintendent Mike Epright, West End Public Schools District.

TCHNetwork was one of five Colorado organizations selected to receive funding after an intensive,

year-long planning process.

With the grant, TCHNetwork will launch Skippy+ Skippy+ builds upon TCHNetwork's existing Skippy (San Juan Kids Cavity Prevention) program, already serving over 1,600 children each year. Though Skippy has provided tremendous preventive dental services for seven years at over 16 regional schools, many of the children treated require restorative care and dentist attention. The children are often unable to receive care due to a number of barriers including lack of insurance, transportation issues, and overall lack of interest in oral health. The next generation of Skippy, Skippy+ incorporates cutting-edge Virtual Dental Home and clinics. The virtual dental home model will remove

rural barriers to care and transform how dental care is delivered in our region

Through Skippy+, children will receive full pre ventive dental services that include in-person and virtual exams by a dentist, x-rays, cleanings, fluoride, sealants, and oral hygiene education twice per year. Specialized, dentists will review all x-rays, develop individualized treatment plans for the children, and ensure children receive necessary restorative care. By providing easier access and a higher level of care regardless of socioeconomic factors, TCHNetwork ms to ensure that all children get the dental care

Tri-County Health Network's three county region is categorized as a Dental Health Professional Shortage Area, a Medically Underserved Area, and a Medically Underserved Population. This signifies an at-risk community with too few dentists and pockets of extreme poverty. Since 2008, TCHNetwork has performed over 100 Skippy clinics in 16 schools, provided over 5,000 treatments to children between ages of 0 and 13, and referred about one-third of children served for restorative care. Skippy has reduced the percentage of children who have not seen a dentist in our region by almost 50 percent and bridged the gap for those uninsured children to be able to receive preventive dental care.

Formed in 2009, TCHNetwork is comprised of a group of healthcare providers in southwest Colorado within the counties of Montrose, Ouray and San Miguel that are committed to improving the quality and coordination of health and healthcare services in this tri-county region by increasing access to healthcare and integrative health services at lower costs information, visit: www.tchnetwork.org

The IRS is cutting 7.000 Jobs

According to the Washington Post, because of an IRS employment reduction of 7,000 jobs, the chance of your small business being audited is pretty darn

According to this analysis on MarketWatch from earlier this year, small businesses with less than \$10 million in assets who filed a "C-Corporation" return in 2014 faced a 1 percent chance of being audited. That number goes down to 0.4 percent for those of us filing "S-Corporation," partnership or multi-member Limited Liability Corporation or LLC returns.

Could it go lower?

The Daily Mail reports that recently announced planned layoffs at three IRS processing centers would result in a loss of 7,000 jobs or 8 percent of its 84,000 member workforce between now and 2024. The jobs will not be replaced.

Cost savings over five years for shutting down centers in Covington, Ky., Fresno, Calif. and Austin, Texas are projected to total about \$266 million with subsequent savings over \$53 million, the IRS said in another report. This should please the hard-liners in Congress who have been successful in decreasing the agency's budget by \$900 million and 17,000 positions
